Eu Antitrust Law

Learning objectives

The course examines the competition rules of the European Union; particularly the competition rules included in Articles 101-106 TFEU.

Competition law includes three "pillars":

- a) prohibition of anti-competitive agreements (the "cartel prohibition");
- b) prohibition of abuse of market power (the "abuse prohibition") and
- c) regulation of mergers and take-overs ("Merger Control").

These rules are supplemented both by other Treaty provisions as well as secondary legislation.

The European Commission enforces the competition rules. The interrelation between Law and economics is very important in this field.

Students need no former knowledge of EU Law before taking this course, but it may require some additional reading.

Students are expected to take an active part in the course since the emphasis is placed upon seminars and discussion groups rather than formal lectures. Students must also be prepared to give presentations to the rest of the group
