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### **Aims**

The Anesthesia, Critical Care and Pain Medicine Program at the University of Milan-Bicocca Medical School is a five-year residency that leads the successful physicians to become certified specialists, therefore eligible to work as anesthesiologists, intensivists or pain doctors within the Italian health care system and the European Union. Each year the Ministry of Health funds approximately 25 places in our program for eligible applicants. The education and training of an adequate number of anesthesiologists currently is a critical factor for the survival and development of several hospitals within the Italian public health care system. We feel the responsibility and the obligation to fulfill such duty to the highest possible level.

Our residents receive unparalleled education in anesthesia, critical care and pain medicine. This education stems from interactions with expert faculty educators, researchers, and outstanding co-residents across the several institutions included in our network. Our residents can expect to advance in their professional development at an accelerated pace. We support our residents' varied academic interests and have a long history of successfully helping them to attain their professional goals.

The rapidly expanding body of knowledge and the continuing introduction of new technology for the treatment of (adult and pediatric) surgical patients, as well as those affected by critical illnesses and chronic pain, have created a need for specialists highly trained in an extensive range of subspecialties. To achieve this goal, our residency program focuses on the knowledge, skills, and attitudes pertinent to the expected roles and competencies of the anesthesia and critical care medicine specialist.

The Residency Program is divided into several training blocks, ranging, on average, from 2 to 6 months. Every resident is evaluated on his/her clinical performance within each rotation. A parallel program of bi-weekly lectures or workshops is also offered. A yearly in-training exam is performed to evaluate the progress of all residents.

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
