Study of the means by which communication takes place

#### Learning objectives

##### *Knowledge and understanding*

- Distinctive features of human language and animal communication systems
- Origin and evolution of language
- Relation between language and society
- Theoretical and experimental approaches to the relation between language and thought
- Linguistic relativity: the influence of specific linguistic structures on non-linguistic cognition

##### *Applying knowledge and understanding*

- Identifying lexical and structural ambiguities
- Critical reading of scientific articles
- Assessment, synthesis and critical evaluation of theoretical debates

## **Contents**

This class adopts an interdisciplinary approach to the debate about the origin and evolution of language, and its relationship with thought, with notions of evolutionary biology, philosophy of mind and of language, and linguistics.

## **Teaching methods**

Lessons will be held in presence, unless further COVID-19-related restrictions are imposed.

The material (slides and, when possible, scientific articles and videos) will be made available on the e-learning site of the course, so that it can also be used by non-attending students.

## **Assessment methods**

The exam is written, with open questions to assess the effective acquisition of theoretical notions, the ability to synthesize and evaluate theoretical debates, and to critically read scientific articles.

The evaluation criteria are: the correctness of the answers, the ability to argue, synthesize, create links, and critically read what was learnt.

Upon student's request, the exam can be completed with an oral examination, on all the course topics.

Although this course is held in Italian, for Erasmus students, course material can also be available in English, and students can take the exam in English if they wish to do so
