Course title

JAPANESE CULTURAL INSTITUTIONS

Topics and course structure

The course is an introduction to the study of Japanese history and culture: a wide-ranging panoramic view starting from the earliest evidence about the origin of people and culture to the entry of Japan into the international framework in modern times.

Objectives

This teaching, with consistent and participatory class attendance, is intended to PROMOTE the following learning, in terms of:

- Knowledge and understanding
- Ability to relate knowledge and models between them differentiated
- Ability to apply knowledge and models

Therefore the course aims to provide students with a solid base of knowledge regarding issues of the historical and cultural nature of Japan. Students will be able to effectively synthesize the acquired knowledge by enhancing the specificities of Japanese culture and integrating it with the knowledge acquired in other disciplines.

Methodologies

Frontal lectures supported by audio-visual aids.

Online and offline teaching materials

Power points of the lectures (upon request), bibliographical indications to deepen some topics covered during the course.
