Course title

The theoretical and epistemological foundations of Traditional Chinese Medicine

Topics and course structure

The course critically discusses the epistemological and theoretical foundations of the forms of knowledge codified as Traditional Chinese Medicine. It uses a comparative perspective that crosses different medical systems, with particular reference to Western medicine.

Objectives

Through the study of the traditional Chinese medicine, the course aims to provide some conceptual tools useful for understanding the cultures and the societies of China and, more generally, the relations between cultures in the contemporary world.

Methodologies

Programme and references for attending students

The lessons aim to provide the conceptual tools to understand Chinese medicine and, more generally, the medical systems and, hence, the complexity of the cultures and of their interrelations. They aim to assist students in analyzing the texts and in preparing the final written test.

The following are the main topics:

- i. The invention of Traditional Chinese Medicine: standardization practices, institutionalization policies, hybridization dynamics.
- ii. Main concepts and practices of Traditional Chinese Medicine: from classical texts to university handbooks.
- iii. The theoretical and epistemological foundations of Chinese medical knowledge.
- iv. The philosophy of change: *Yi Jing*.
- v. Correlative thinking.
- vi. Chinese medicine as a cultural system.
- vii. Therapeutic efficacy.

Reference materials will be suggested during the course

Written exam.

Students are required to produce a written paper that can cover theoretical aspects or case-studies.
