Course title

Historical anthropology

Topics and course structure

Historical anthropology is a field of study across anthropology and history born out of the awareness that societies can only be understood if they are analysed historically. Different societies have different conceptions of time and different histories. In order to study social life in a diachronic perspective, historical anthropology combines archival research, ethnography, oral history, material traces, etc.

The course tracks the evolution of the relationship between anthropology and history, and the emergence of historical anthropology, within different academic traditions. The course also presents an outline of the main methodologies and some of the research areas of this discipline.

Part of the course will take the form of a seminar. We will analyse some historical-anthropological studies, reflecting on the sources they are built upon (particularly colonial and missionary sources), on sources' context of production and preservation, on their materiality and possible uses.

Objectives

The course aims to enable students to:

- master the main issues of historical anthropology;
- apply historical-anthropological analysis to different cultural context;
- know specific terms and categories, and understand the differences and similarities between the various historical-anthropological

theories.

The course examines the use and value of historical documents in anthropological research. We will explore the nature of different documentary sources, oral history and oral tradition. We will focus on the skills needed to evaluate and use of documentary and oral sources to approach the past ethnographically.
