Course title

Anthropology of religions

Topics and course structure

The course analyses the main anthropological theories of religion, showing the relations with the epistemological and historical-social context within which these theories have been elaborated.

The anthropological study of religions attends to religious life via the study of everyday practices. Rather than understanding religion as a set of beliefs, anthropologists examine mental and practical behaviours and attitudes that can be defined as "religious". These everyday practices are constituted by many aspects of social life including performance, politics and power, gender and desire.

The course mainly focuses on the material aspects of religion (body, objects, images, etc.), and takes into consideration religious representations and practices in relation to the social contexts of reference. According to current perspective the course aims to show how each religion needs material elements to refer to in order to affirm its own "truth".

Objectives

Through this teaching, with constant and participative attendance of lessons, we intend to promote the following learning, in terms of:

Knowledge and understanding

Students will acquire specific competences on the meanings and the roles of religious concepts and practices in

different social and historical context. The focus will be on the materiality of religions

Ability to relate differentiated knowledge and models.

Students will learn to manage the different knowledge and models about religions and its related concepts and connect them to the other fields of the anthropological discipline

Ability to apply knowledge and models

Students will learn to apply knowledge and models learned during the course to the analysis of contemporary societies and will develop an intellectual stance to understand the multiplicity of religious realities.

Methodologies

The course makes use of a variety of methodologies: lectures, class discussions on materials such as texts (including those scheduled for the examination), slides, audiovisual documents provided by the lecturer or autonomously proposed by the students; participation of researchers presenting current research.

Attending students could be involved in short ethnographic projects experiences in order to develop a theoretical discussion.

Additional teaching materials to the scheduled texts (background articles, documents, films) will be made available on the course page.
