Course title

Anthropology of Kinship and Gender

Topics and course structure

The course 1) presents different theoretical approaches in the anthropology of kinship and gender; 2) it explores the impact of feminist anthropology and gender studies on the anthropological analysis of kinship; 3) the focus is on recent debates on reproduction and other transitions in individual and households' life-cycles.

Objectives

The course aims to provide master student with:

1. knowledge and tools for a critical understanding of kinship and gender;
2. abilities to identify and make connections between different understandings of kinship and gender;
3. skills for applying specific models of kinship and gender to the understanding human reproduction and other individuals and domestic groups life transitions.

Methodologies

The course draws on a variety of methodologies including: lectures; readings and watching videos: class activities

on the topics covered by the course. These include: in-class discussion of texts covered by the exam syllabus, watching and discussion of audiovisual documents provided either by the lecturer or by students, and presentation and discussion of exercises assigned to students.

Programme and references for attending students

Current debates on kinship have shown a complex correlation between the biological aspects of reproduction and human life and broader kinship relationships. This is due partly to the impact of gender studies on kinship and to a new-found interest in the body and in personhood, as well to demographic changes, and to the spread of artificial reproductive technologies and of new family forms.

The course explores some of the central issues in the anthropology of kinship and gender. It introduces key concepts such as "descent", "marriage", "domestic groups/cycles", "sex/ gender" and "relationality". It also analyses contemporary debates on reproductive health, assisted reproductive technologies, multiple family forms and family dynamics.

The focus is on reproduction and other life transitions as privileged events to observe the interactions of gender, kinship, politics, religion, science and law, and to reflect on how these interrelated social fields affect relations and subjectivities.
