

## COURSE SYLLABUS

### **Geopolitics**

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#### **Learning objectives**

The course provides the necessary knowledge to understand major geopolitical dynamics related, mainly, to the Anthropocene, as well as to other critical issues, in order to make it possible for students to disentangle, understand, and frame the main contemporary global issues and their implications on world politics.

#### **Contents**

The geopolitics of the Anthropocene and of other critical issues, energy and the fossil fuels regime, global climate politics and the implications on world politics.

#### **Detailed program**

The course explores the geopolitical dynamics between the Anthropocene, conflicts, disasters, food security, economic growth, water, and migration. Then, the course analyses the role of the fossil fuels industry in climate change in view of the necessary energy transition. Finally, the issue analyzed are framed in terms of world politics

The topics covered in the course are dealt with in an interdisciplinary perspective and through the use of case studies.

#### **Prerequisites**

Knowledge of the theoretical and methodological foundations of social sciences and good writing and communication skills.

## **Teaching methods**

Lectures.

Collective analysis and comment of the relevant scholarly literature.

Seminars by Key-informants.

## **Assessment methods**

Written exam. It requires students to develop a critical argument about an issue that covers and connects different topics analysed in the course. This modality is the most appropriate for assessing the critical skills developed by students in relation to the interdisciplinary nature of the course.
