Social Capital and Local Socioeconomic Systems

Learning objectives

The course aims to provide students with the necessary skills to acknowledge the role of social capital in specific areas of economic life.

The objectives of the course are:

- introduce and articulate the reflections around the concept of social capital (in Italy and abroad)
- identify the fields of application of the concept in some areas of the sociology of labour and local development
- provide basic tools for the analysis of organisational networks

Contents

Concepts and theories about social capital, trust, social and organizational networks. Role of social capital and inter-organizational networks in different local production systems

Detailed program

The course consists of two parts. The first one will deal with the following topics:

- Social Capital Theory
 - * Introduction (Bourdieu, Putnam)
 - * James Coleman: trust and Social Capital
 - * Social Capital and Social Networks
- Organizational networks and Local Production Systems

- * Framework for the Analysis of organizational networks
- * Empirical cases of inter-organizational networks' analysis

In the second part, attention will be turned to some recent transformations of local economic systems, focusing on the effects of remote working on social networks and local systems. Students will be asked to design and develop a brief research project.

The course will involve a semi-public presentation of the results of the research activities.

Prerequisites

Basic knowledge of sociology

Teaching methods

Set of lectures and workshops; case studies discussion and presentations; qualitative research.

Assessment methods

The final exam consists of an essay, developed on the basis of the texts discussed in class, which can be consulted during the exam.

The following dimensions will be assessed:

- Knowledge and understanding of the topics
- Capacity for critical reworking of information
- Internal coherence of the essay (introduction-development-conclusions)
- Formal accuracy, including bibliographical references

Attending students will present research papers on scientific articles and participate in individual and group exercises during the course. All these activities will contribute to the final assessment.
