Course title

Spectral Lives

Topics and course structure

In a much-quoted page of *The Human Condition*, Hannah Arendt talks about a "space where I appear to others as others appear to me, where humans do not merely exist like other living or inanimate things but make their explicit appearance," and defines it as "the space of appearing." By "appearing" Arendt means making oneself visible, revealing oneself publicly through speech and action.

Yet, what are the conditions that govern access to this space of appearing, determining who can be seen, heard and recognized? And, most importantly, what does it mean to exist without access to this space - to exist, as it were, without appearing?

The course intends to reflect on these questions by making use of contributions from different fields: social research, anthropological inquiry, literature, and philosophy.

Objectives

Through this teaching, by means of an active attendance to lectures, we intend to promote:

- Knowledge and understanding of the models of self-understanding of the human being - understood both as a singularity and in relation to different social formations - developed within the Western philosophical tradition, with particular reference to the ontological, ethical, political, religious and cultural variables in general that structure the fields of experience and sediment in collective mentalities;
- Ability to put into relation different paradigms, grasping the recurring tension between historical and

- transcendental approaches;
- Ability to apply knowledge and models, contributing to the development of critical skills for interpreting cultural contexts, and to the autonomy of judgment with respect to the theoretical tools and research protocols deployed.

Methodologies

Lectures will be mainly in the DE mode; three lectures will be in the DI modo. Different methodologies will be deployed: traditional lectures; class discussions on materials such as texts, slide presentations, audiovisual documents provided by the lecturer or independently proposed by students; participation of scholars presenting researches in progress.
