Learning objectives

The course aims to provide advanced competencies related to clinical diagnosis and the understanding of psychological dynamics, with particular attention to defense mechanisms and personality organizations/disorders, especially within the narcissistic and borderline areas. Affective disorders will also be addressed, along with an indepth exploration of contemporary models relevant to clinical practice.

Prerequisites

Basic knowledge of Psychopathology (DSM-5) and Dynamic Psychology is required. Students who do not possess this background are encouraged to inform the instructor in order to receive supplementary reading materials.

Interactive activities and clinical applications (approximately 30%)

Use of clinical materials, videos, and guided discussions

Assessment methods

Assessment Methods

Written exam (30 multiple-choice questions; a minimum score of 18/30 is required to access the oral exam)

Oral exam covering the entire course content, including prerequisites

Multiple-choice questions are intended to extensively assess the student's knowledge, while open-ended questions aim to evaluate the ability to think critically and make connections between acquired knowledge. The assessment criteria are: accuracy of answers for multiple-choice questions; adequacy of content, logical and formal organization, and use of terminology for open-ended responses.
