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#### Learning objectives

Knowledge and understanding:

## **Detailed program**

concept of modernity and tendencies towards abstraction;

- Sociological investigation and models of society;
- social and cultural functions of sociology;
- the logic of sociological reasoning;

- globalization and world society.
- Reality as a social construction.
- social stratification and social mobility;
- sex and gender, “race” and ethnicity; culture, cultural differences;
- postmodernity, hypermodernity, supermodernity, global society, liquid society, risk society.

## **Prerequisites**

Basic educational skills in logic, social culture and reasonable ability in learning, writing and communication.

## **Teaching methods**

The course consists of 56 hours, of which approximately 70% involves expository teaching (lectures using slides, audio, and video), and 30% involves interactive teaching (exercises, group work, presentation of case studies from which to develop individual and group assignments, prepared and discussed during the course).

A maximum of 30% of the lessons may be delivered remotely, combining both (70%) expository and (30%) interactive teaching methods

## **Assessment methods**

Final written exam (time available: 120 minutes):

- 28 multiple choice questions
- 2 general open-ended questions (one page-long limit): one on the classics, one on a contemporary sociological topic.

Optional oral exam.

The assessments aim to verify the ability to use the sociological analysis tools provided during the course to interpret reality, as well as the critical understanding of the exam texts. The quality of the candidates' exposition and argumentative skills will also be evaluated, along with the depth of any independent developments in their approach to the subject.
