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#### Course title

Ethnographic writing

#### Topics and course structure

Although ethnography does not totally coincide with the production of written texts, the latter still constitute its main products. Experimenting with writing practices and analysing them critically therefore means measuring oneself against the heart of anthropological research, bringing to light its 'constructive' character, its artificial and at the same time 'poietic' nature, i.e. essentially creative. The course, of a purely workshop nature, will focus on this apparent oxymoron, showing on the contrary its interpretative potential, applicable beyond the specific disciplinary field of anthropology.

Through exercises and didactic activities, the students will first of all be called upon to think about ethnographic writing in a reflexive manner, retracing their own intellectual path and professional biography in order to open up spaces for collective debate. Starting from this positioning, the various phases in which anthropological research is articulated and the writing practices connected to them will be considered, both during the collection of data and during their re-elaboration (including bibliographical documentation, the drafting of field notes, the transcription of interviews and focus groups, the elaboration of ethnographies, the design), focusing in particular on the structure and forms of scientific texts.

In parallel, thanks to the group discussion of some academic articles and the analysis of other materials (blogs, websites, publishing platforms), the theoretical debate concerning ethnographic writing and, more generally, the production of anthropological knowledge and its dissemination and communication will be explored.

The approval of credits is linked to active attendance of at least 75% of the workshop meetings. Students who are unable to acquire the 4 credits through active participation in the workshop activities for at least 75% of the 40 hours foreseen (or through the other channels foreseen by the degree course) may contact the lecturer and the

Assistant Teacher of the Workshops (to be defined) before the start of the workshop to report their specific situation. The procedures for the acquisition of the 4 CFUs by exempt students will be explained during the first meeting of the workshop.

## Objectives

This course, through regular and active participation in lessons, aims to promote the following learning outcomes in terms of:

Knowledge and understanding:

- Understanding the forms, characteristics and political and cultural meanings of ethnographic texts;
- Exploring the academic debate on ethnographic writing and, more generally, on the production of anthropological knowledge and its dissemination and communication.

Ability to apply knowledge and understanding:

- Produce, rework and organise ethnographic material;
- Experiment with scientific-academic writing models;
- Design and develop a research project.

Autonomy of judgement:

- Understand the complexity of cultural processes, welcoming and valuing different points of view and overcoming stereotypes and prejudices.
- Evaluate the consequences of one's actions and decisions, adopting a reflective and responsible attitude.

Communication skills:

- Express ideas, knowledge and arguments clearly.
- Formulate well-founded judgements, integrating information from different and reliable sources.

Learning skills:

- Create a space for reflection throughout the educational and professional biography of students, enabling them to relate personal experiences and acquired knowledge through writing.
- Develop and refine their learning methodologies, independently identifying and constructing objects and topics of study.

## Methodologies

The course, which is workshop-based in nature, consists of approximately 30 hours of interactive teaching and approximately 10 hours of lectures (in Italian). Conditions will therefore be fostered for the creation of an environment where students can feel free to express themselves without fear of judgement.

Lessons will favour participative teaching methodologies such as: active learning, interactive lecturing, plenary discussion, individual and group exercises, portfolio (dossier).

There will be no classes delivered remotely (except for the first meeting which, as stated above, will be streamed to

allow those who have asked for an exemption - within the time and in the manner laid down by the Degree Course - to find out about the activities envisaged for obtaining the 4 CFUs)

## Online and offline teaching materials

The workshop includes the use of academic texts, lecture sheets, use of videos, e-learning platform.

Individualised teaching materials will be selected if necessary according to the personal and professional interests of the students.

## Programme and references

The programme includes ten lessons, entitled as follows:

1. Writing about oneself and others. Introduction to the workshop and first orientation exercises
2. Making and unmaking ethnography. The field notes
3. Creating listening spaces. Interviews in anthropology
4. What do I do now? Analysing data
5. Writing an academic article
6. When the going gets tough. The thesis
7. The research project (objectives, expected results, actions and timeline)
8. The research project (methodology, outputs and deliverables, ethical issues)
9. Other writings, the writings of others. Ethnography outside the academy
10. An evaluation of the workshop.

The programme may be subject to change according to the needs expressed by the attending students.
