Course title

Arab culture

Topics and course structure

This course provides a critical introduction to Arab culture, understood as a complex set of religious practices, intellectual traditions, literary productions, and historical developments that have emerged in Arabic-speaking societies from the pre-Islamic period to the contemporary era.

Particular attention will be devoted to the formation of Arab-Islamic civilization, the religious and cultural foundations of Islam, the development of the Arabic literary tradition, and selected key issues shaping the contemporary Arab world.

The course aims to equip students with analytical tools to understand:

the formation and historical development of Arab-Islamic civilization

the religious and cultural foundations of Islam

the evolution of Arabic literary traditions

major historical, political, and cultural dynamics of the contemporary Arab world

The course is structured into three main modules.

Module 1

Islam and Islamic Civilization

The first module introduces the religious and historical foundations of Islam, a religion that has played a central role in shaping Arab-Islamic civilization and the cultural and political history of societies in the Arab world.

The module will address the following topics:

the historical context of pre-Islamic Arabia

Arab society and poetry during the *ʿAbbāsiyya*

the prophetic mission of Muḥammad

the formation of the first Muslim community

the period of the Rightly Guided Caliphs

the Qurʾān and the development of major exegetical traditions

Particular attention will be devoted to the diversity of interpretations of Islam across different historical periods and within the contemporary world. In this context, the emergence and development of the major branches of Islam (Sunni and Shiʿi) will also be examined.

Module 2

History and Society in the Arab World

The second module provides an overview of the major historical and political transformations that have shaped Arab societies.

The module will focus in particular on:

the formation and expansion of the Islamic empires

cultural and intellectual developments in the medieval Islamic world

interactions between the Arab world, Europe, and the Mediterranean

European colonialism in the Arab world

the emergence of modern Arab states

Part of this module will be dedicated to the Palestinian question, a central issue in the political and cultural history of the contemporary Middle East.

Additional teaching materials will be made available on the course e-learning platform, including lecture slides, historical maps, primary documents, and selected academic articles.

Module 3

Literatures and Cultures of the Arab World

The third module explores key cultural expressions of Arab modernity through the study of literary texts and intellectual traditions.

Topics include:

an introduction to the Arabic literary tradition

the concept of *adab*

the emergence of modern Arabic literature during the *nahḍa* (Arab cultural renaissance)

literature and identity in the contemporary Arab world

narrative representations of exile and displacement

Particular attention will be devoted to Palestinian literature and to literary representations of exile and diaspora.

Objectives

The course aims to provide students with a critical understanding of Arab culture through an interdisciplinary approach that integrates historical, religious, and literary perspectives. Through the study of key historical developments, religious traditions, and literary texts, students will acquire the analytical tools necessary to interpret the cultural and intellectual dynamics of Arab societies from the pre-Islamic period to the contemporary era.

Learning Outcomes (Dublin Descriptors)

1. Knowledge and understanding

Students will acquire a foundational knowledge of the main dimensions of Arab culture, including its historical development, religious traditions, and literary production.

2. Applying knowledge and understanding

Students will be able to apply the knowledge acquired during the course to the analysis and interpretation of literary texts, historical documents, and cultural materials related to the Arab world.

3. Making judgements

Students will develop the ability to critically interpret cultural, political, and religious dynamics within the contemporary Arab world, situating them within their broader historical context.

4. Communication skills

Students will be able to present and discuss the main themes addressed in the course in a clear and structured manner, using appropriate academic terminology.

5. Learning skills

Students will develop independent learning skills through the critical reading and analysis of the texts included in the course bibliography.

Methodologies

The course consists of lectures complemented by interactive components that encourage students' participation in classroom discussions.

During the course, literary texts, historical documents, and audiovisual materials will also be analyzed in order to deepen the understanding of the topics addressed.

Lecture slides and teaching materials will be made available on the course e-learning platform.

Online and offline teaching materials

Classes will be held in person. Course slides will be uploaded to the e-learning platform, together with information on how to access films, videos, and the readings assigned for the course.
