## SYLLABUS DEL CORSO

### Indicatori e Analisi per lo Sviluppo Umano e la Sicurezza

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#### Learning objectives

The course aims to provide students with theoretical, methodological, and practical tools for analyzing processes of human development, risk, and safety through the critical use of social indicators.

The course is based on the idea that risk and security are not exclusively objective phenomena or ones that can be measured neutrally, but are also social, cultural, institutional, and political constructs. From this perspective, indicators are not merely descriptive tools: they help define public issues, guide decisions, classify populations and territories, and make forms of vulnerability and inequality visible or invisible.

The course therefore focuses on the relationship between risk, vulnerability, exposure, capacity, resilience, inequalities, institutions, and public policies, with particular attention to human security, urban security, workplace safety, environmental risks, and emergency governance.

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- understand the main sociological and methodological concepts related to risk, security, human development, vulnerability, exposure, capacity, and resilience;
- distinguish between context indicators, leading indicators, process indicators, and outcome indicators;
- construct, select, and interpret simple and composite indicators;
- critically analyze statistical sources, administrative data, surveys, geographic data, open data, and institutional reports;
- assess the limitations, biases, ethical implications, and potential stigmatizing uses of indicators;
- develop a system of indicators applied to a specific case;
- communicate results through risk profiles, summary sheets, and policy briefs.

#### Contents

The course deals with the use of social indicators for the analysis of human development and security, with a particular focus on risk prevention, social vulnerability, quality of life, and the responsiveness of institutions and communities.

The course will discuss key concepts such as risk, hazard, threat, exposure, vulnerability, capacity, resilience,

harm, critical event, risk perception, and institutional trust.

A significant portion of the course will be devoted to the design of valid, reliable, comparable, and usable indicators in the contexts of social research, evaluation, and public policy. Indicators related to human development, well-being, inequalities, urban safety, workplace safety, social vulnerability, environmental emergencies, and risk communication will be analyzed.

## Detailed program

### 1. Risk, Security, and Human Development

The first part of the course introduces the fundamental concepts of risk, security, and human development. Topics covered will include risk as a social construct, the distinction between objective risk and perceived risk, the relationship between risk and modernity, the role of culture in the perception of danger, the difference between safety and security, and the concept of human security.

Particular attention will be given to the link between risk, social inequalities, vulnerability, trust in institutions, and collective response capacity.

### 2. Social Indicators, Concepts, and Measurement

The second part is dedicated to the construction of indicators. The steps leading from concept to indicator will be analyzed: conceptualization, identification of dimensions, selection of variables, construction of simple and composite indicators, definition of thresholds, classifications, and rankings.

The main quality criteria for indicators will be discussed: validity, reliability, sensitivity, comparability, timeliness, transparency, and usability. The risks associated with the misuse of indicators will also be analyzed, particularly when they lead to oversimplifications, stigmatizing geographic classifications, or governance effects on the populations under observation.

### 3. Types of Indicators

A specific section of the course will be dedicated to distinguishing between different families of indicators:

- context indicators, which describe the social, economic, demographic, territorial, and institutional conditions within which a phenomenon occurs;
- early warning indicators, which signal conditions of risk or vulnerability before critical events occur;
- process indicators, which measure how interventions, services, procedures, or policies are implemented;
- outcome indicators, which measure final effects, results, or events that have already occurred.

This distinction will be applied to various fields: urban safety, labor, the environment, local welfare, and emergencies.

### 4. Data Sources and Information Systems

The third part of the course focuses on data sources. Official statistics, administrative data, surveys, georeferenced data, open data, institutional reports, and digital sources will be examined.

The main Italian and European sources useful for the study of human development and safety will be analyzed: Istat, BES, INAIL, ISPRA, Eurostat, Eurofound, EU-OSHA, local governments, urban safety plans, civil protection plans, social plans, and regional planning documents.

### 5. Areas of Application

The fourth part addresses several specific areas of application:

#### Workplace Safety

Indicators related to workplace accidents, occupational diseases, work-related stress, violence and harassment, the safety climate, training, prevention, and work organization will be analyzed.

#### Urban and Territorial Safety

Indicators of recorded crime, victimization, perceived insecurity, urban decay, access to services, neighborhood vulnerability, social cohesion, social capital, and institutional trust will be discussed.

#### Environmental Risks and Emergencies

Indicators related to extreme events, territorial exposure, social vulnerability, preparedness, institutional capacity, risk communication, and community resilience will be analyzed.

#### Human Development, Well-being, and Inequalities

Indicators of quality of life, health, education, employment, participation, inequalities, sustainability, and access to opportunities will be examined.

## 6. Governance, Risk Assessment, and Risk Communication

The final part of the course will be dedicated to the relationship between indicators, public decision-making, and communication. Students will be guided in developing a system of indicators applied to a concrete case and in drafting a brief policy brief.

The final project will allow students to connect theory, methodology, data, and operational decisions.

## Prerequisites

There are no specific prerequisites. A basic understanding of social research methodology is helpful.

## Teaching methods

The course consists of 56 hours, of which approximately 50% will be dedicated to lecture-based instruction (lectures using slides, audio, and video) and 50% to interactive instruction (exercises, small-group work, and the presentation of case studies that will serve as the basis for individual and small-group assignments, which will be prepared and discussed during the course).

For working students and those who are unable to attend in-person classes, dedicated sessions will be held to summarize the course's key topics.

## Assessment methods

Learning outcomes will be assessed through an oral exam and/or the presentation and discussion of a practical project.

The project may consist of developing a system of indicators related to a specific case, accompanied by a brief methodological discussion and a final policy brief.
